O sing to the Lord a new song; sing his praise in the congregation of the faithful.


2 Let Israel rejoice in their maker; let the children of Zion be joyful in their king.

4 For the Lord has pleasure in his people and adorns the poor with salvation.


5 Let the faithful be joyful in glory; let them rejoice in their ranks,
