



# Psalm 19 Common Worship




1. The heavens are telling the glo-ry of God and the fir-ma-ment pro - clams his handiwork.




2. One day pours out its song to an - other and one night unfolds knowledge to an - other.




3. They have neither speech nor language and their voi - ces are not heard,

the commandment of the Lord is pure and gives light to the eyes.


9. The fear of the Lord is clean and en - dures for ever; the judgements of the Lord are true and

right-eous al- to- gether. 10. More to be desired are they than gold, more than much fine gold,


sweeter also than honey, dripping from the honeycomb. 11. By them also is your ser- vant




taught and in keeping them there is great re - ward.




12. Who can tell how oft - en they of - fend; O cleanse me from my sec-ret faults!




13. Keep your servant also from presumptuous sins lest they get do - min-ion over me;
