


Musical notation for the first system of Psalm 2, featuring a treble and bass staff with a common time signature.


2 The kings of the earth rise up, and the rulers take counsel together, against the Lord and a-




gainst his anointed: 3 Let us break their bonds asunder and cast away their cords from us.'
